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Introduction

Sioux Rivers MHDS Region was formed under Iowa Code Chapter 28E to create a Mental Health and Disability Service (MHDS) Region in compliance with Iowa Code 331.390. The annual service and budget plan is a component of the Management Plan which includes three parts: Annual Service and Budget Plan, Annual Report and Policies and Procedures Manual in compliance with Iowa Administrative Code 441.25.

The FY2024 Annual Service and Budget Plan covers the period of July 1, 2023, to June 30, 2024. The Annual Service and Budget Plan includes local access points, targeted case management providers, crisis services, intensive mental health services, a description of the scope of services to be provided including core services, budget and financial provisions, and provider reimbursement provisions.

G. Financial Forecasting Measures

The following is a description of the financial forecasting measures used by Sioux Rivers MHDS Region in the identification of service need and funding necessary for services.

This past FY23, Sioux Rivers MHDS Region experienced changes regarding funding sources, from receiving hybrid funding to a singular state funding source. With the changes brought forth in using a singular funding source, Sioux Rivers MHDS Region benefits by having a FY24 beginning balance greater than that of the hybrid system. This is based upon some counties within the region not being able to levy any additional dollars for expanding services.

A singular funded region also comes with a few challenges. These challenges include assisting regional staff, governing board members, and provider partners in overcoming the county-based way of thinking to a more regional based way of thinking. Staff, board members, and providers need to begin to look at what benefits the entire Sioux Rivers MHDS Region to ensure quality care and access no matter where one resides within the six counties. Efforts were put into breaking down these boundaries and to build a more team-based atmosphere. Such efforts included, quarterly meetings being set up with providers to allow for an open forum to discuss strengths, concerns and funding needs as the FY evolved. These meetings also provide stakeholders, and providers the ability to support the quality mental health and disability services work being done across the region and not just within their individual county service area. As a result, more regional collaboration has been noticed and emphasis in this area will continue into FY24. In addition, regional staff have been complying with different personal related policies and procedures according to their individual county of record. This has caused inconsistencies with regional staff members and misunderstandings related to how the regional policies and procedures are to be followed. Efforts have begun and will continue to be made into FY 24 to show unity across the region as regional staff policies have been developed and a new regional handbook will go into effect start of FY24. Overcoming these challenges and continuing to address these needs allows for all voices to be heard regarding the FY24 budgeting needs.

This past FY23, Sioux Rivers MHDS Region, has not only undergone changes in funding source, but also in leadership. The change in leadership has brought in a new way of looking at utilization of core services and non-core related services offered across the region. Over the past six months, regional staff, board members, stakeholders, and providers have worked towards creative approaches in meeting the needs of all residents residing within the six-county region. Out of this collaboration, new services are being supported in FY24.

Sioux Rivers MHDS Region is moving towards a more comprehensive Justice System Program in FY24. Sioux Rivers will be assisting our regional jails with both outpatient mental health services and payment for psychotropic medications. By history, Sioux Rivers has not funded outpatient mental health services in our jails and only funded emergency medication evaluations. Following these evaluations, if medications were prescribed to the inmate, it was the jail's responsibility to purchase the medication. Identified as a gap, moving into FY24 Sioux Rivers MHDS Region will begin paying for the psychotropic medications as prescribed by Flow State as our contracted jail-based evaluators. In addition, outpatient mental health services will now be offered to inmates prior to release in hopes that they will develop necessary therapeutic rapport with a provider and make it easier for them continue with mental health services and medication management post release. The need to fund outpatient mental health services stems from a gap in coverage when an individual is incarcerated. Currently, individuals immediately lose any Medicaid coverage when they are incarcerated or uninsured prior. The FY24 budget allows for funding of these gap-based service needs related to our population involved in the justice system.

With the passing of SF 471, Sioux Rivers MHDS Region will also be exploring Competency Restoration within our six-county region. As noted in the FY24 budget, money has been allocated for the development and funding of this program. However, at the time of this Annual Service and Budget Report it is unclear as to the overall cost of this Core Service for FY24 and data will be collected to be more precise in the upcoming fiscal years.

April 1, 2023, marks the end of the Medicaid continuous coverage requirement. During the recent public health emergency, Medicaid was required to maintain continuous health care coverage for all members. This meant that if a

member's financial earnings changed it would not automatically disqualify them from coverage. As a result of President Biden signing the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2023 this continuous coverage ends, meaning Medicaid members will go through a redetermination process. As a result, many members who have benefitted from continuous coverage will find themselves no longer qualifying for Medicaid benefits. In preparation, FY24 has allowed for additional dollars being placed in mental health assessment/evaluation and outpatient therapy services. Anticipating many regional residents will be losing Medicaid funding.

The MHDS Regions across the state have been working to provide more consistent services for all lowans. As part of consistency of care, discussions were had regarding standardizing eligibility criteria and population groups covered for funding. FY24 will bring upon changes to support more consistency of state funded core services. To support these efforts, Sioux Rivers MHDS Region will be adding cost share amounts for adult applicants. Currently cost share amounts are only supported in the Sioux Rivers MHDS Regional management plan for child applicants. Additionally, Sioux Rivers MHDS Region has not supported the Developmental Disability or the Brain Injury populations unless the individual had been Grandfathered in by past regional/county funding. FY24 has allocated some dollars to assist these populations in the Core Services areas if an eligible application is made for funding across the entire six regional counties.

Regions have only been tasked to ensure that funding for services are available to children for the past couple of years. However, the core service areas have remained limited. Currently, the only core services required for children involve crisis-based programming and treatment related to mental health diagnosis. Sioux Rivers MHDS Region is committed to continuing to focus on children's programming and sees this as a potential area for growth and development regarding regional funding. FY24 has allocated continued support for school-based therapy services and additional funding for children's respite and peer support-based programming, which are all identified as optional additional core services.

As we continue to see an increase in the need for an IRSH level of care and requests from other regions to provide services at this level of care. We also continue to experience several residents who require gap coverage and care as they await funding sources and waiting lists such as the Elderly Wavier and ID Waiver. This means that Transitional Housing remains a need as many of these individuals do not meet the level of care for an RCF, IRSH, or HAB supports. In FY23, Lakes Life Skills provided 3 beds for the IRSH level of care and Sioux Rivers will continue to work with this provider to open up additional beds in FY24. Funding for Transitional Housing was also secured in FY23 for The Pride Group to develop a transitional living program. Unfortunately, staff shortages have made it difficult to open the transitional home and as a result continued support and encouragement will be provided in FY24.

Crisis services is a core service which strongly relies on regional support, and for this reason no reduction in dollars will be received by our three crisis providers for FY24. By history, Sioux River MHDS Region has allocated money for crisis program development and continued access to care. It is not unknown that the monies spent have been met with low utilization numbers reported in many of these core programs. This is an area that the region has also been assisting providers in focusing on gap care and best practices. Moving into FY24, emphasis will continue to be on data collection and analytics. Analysis of this data will be utilized in a future financial forecasting and programmatic decisions. Regarding best practices, a new crisis subcommittee has been formed in partnership with two neighboring regions who share common crisis providers. This subcommittee is being tasked with formulating ways to increase utilization of crisis services, which may involve signing of MOUs to share the mobile crisis work amongst the three crisis providers. It will also look at ways to standardize policies and procedures to assist each other in coverage, as staff shortages tend to be a big reason for lack of utilization. FY25 budget will reflect the data analytics and the work of this subcommittee.

FY 24 will also see funding reductions in some areas related to supplemental funds which were provided as additional support dollars to our providers. Reduction in funding to the 24-hour crisis and phone line is noted because of the state funded crisis lines. There is also decreased allocation for supported employment regarding support employment funding dollars, which to providers is known as the work grant. However, it will be reviewed quarterly and if budget allows

additional dollars will be reallocated to these providers. These reductions in funding are necessary to expand our core services and as a result of the ending of continuous Medicaid coverage.

Additional Changes FY24:

Legislation has passed a code change which removes the MHDS region from County Code 331 and places the regional structure into the Mental Health and Disability Services Section of Code 225.

FY24 will also bring changes to our overall Regional Board Structure with the passing of SF471. The board changes gives county elected officials with no more than 49% representation and increases provider presence in board membership.

The anticipated 5% fund balance will follow FY24 and will provide some challenges when completing FY25 Annual Service and Budget Report. The FY24 budget was developed with the lower fund balance in consideration moving forward.

Regional staff structure will also change in FY24 to bring in more specialization in service coordination. With specialization of service coordination, the region will be able to better support our providers by making it easier to build and nurture a relationship with one or two regional employees who provide service coordination in their area of MHDS service care.

Due to changes in legislation as well as standardization of funding across regions, FY24 will need to bring changes to The Sioux Rivers MHDS Regional Management Plan Policy and Procedures. The Management Plan will be revised and presented to the Regional Governance Board, and MHDS Commission prior to the beginning of FY24. However, the Annual Services and Budget Report does reflect these upcoming changes as they are driven by legislature and standardization. Competency restoration will be added as a core services. Regarding justice related services, psychotropic medications will be a covered service as it is prescribed by Flow State, Sioux Rivers MHDS Region contracted provider. Increased funding availability will be granted to the DD and the BI populations as well as a cost shared option for adult eligible participants.

Great strides have been made during FY23 for Sioux Rivers MHDS region and this will continue in FY24 as Sioux Rivers MHDS Regional team members, advisory board members, regional governance board members, providers and partners will continue to enhance the core services and additional core services provided. Focus will remain on overall client wellness and identification of additional service care gaps.

H. Provider Reimbursement Provisions

The following is a description of the types of funding used by Sioux Rivers MHDS Region.

• Fee for service:

Sioux Rivers MHDS Region will contract with MHDS providers whose base of operation is within the region. Sioux Rivers MHDS Region may also honor contracts that other regions have with their local providers or may choose to contract with providers outside of the region. A contract may not be required with providers that provide one-time or as needed services. A fee for service approach will be utilized in most provider contracts outlining the services to be provided and the rate of reimbursement. All payments will be based on a preauthorized request for service authorization with the exception of court ordered payments, such as civil commitment costs and crisis services.

- Block grant payments:
 - Block grant payments are made to regional service providers when the service they are delivering is on a per capita basis and does not have adequate funding or other sources to cover the operational costs. Example: Crisis Services
- Compensation for a "system of care" approach: Sioux Rivers MHDS Region does not have a per member/per month reimbursement model in place. However, it is value-based contracting is something that may be explored in the future as health care reimbursement appears to be moving towards this approach.
- Use of nontraditional providers:

When a non-traditional provider arrangement is more appropriate than a fee for service approach with a contracted provider, the Coordinators of Disability Services will work with the region's CEO to request such arrangements. A non-traditional provider may be an individual, organization and/or business who delivers services in the consumer's home and/or other community setting. Non-traditional providers typically are individuals, organizations, or businesses which do not provide MHDS services as a part of their normal business. These services are not to provide treatment but are supportive and may be rehabilitative in focus and are initiated when there is a reasonable likelihood that such services will benefit the consumer's functioning, assist them in maintaining community tenure, and act as an alternative way to achieve the consumer's stated goals or outcomes. A request for funding can be made by any consumer, or the consumer's authorized representative, to utilize non-traditional providers for services as approved in the Regional Management Plan. Non-traditional providers may be subject to certain licensing, certification, accreditation, or other state approval standards.

Incorporation of all funding sources for individuals including Medicaid:
 Sioux Rivers MHDS Region is responsible for ensuring that MHDS services are available to all residents of the
 region regardless of funding source. Sioux Rivers MHDS Region will ensure that individuals apply for all funding
 sources prior to accessing regional funding, including private insurance, Medicaid, Medicare, and other funding
 mechanisms which ensure that individuals and their families are able to optimally live, work, and recreate in
 integrated communities of their choice.
